

2019-2020 LEGISLATIVE SCORECARD

MASSPIRG is a consumer group that stands up to powerful interests whenever they threaten our health and safety, our financial security, or our right to fully participate in our democratic society. We have compiled this legislative scorecard as a tool to educate Massachusetts residents about the voting records of their elected officials.

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From the Executive Director

When consumers are cheated, when our public health is threatened, or powerful interests have more say than ordinary people, our job is to stand up for the public interest. We're funded by thousands of supporters, from across the political spectrum, which allows us to be independent and to focus on doing what's best for the public.

This scorecard grades legislators from the 2019-2020 legislative session on a selection of public interest issues: protecting consumers, improving voter access to the ballot, investing in public transportation, protecting public health by eliminating toxic flame retardants and banning sale of flavored tobacco products, and reducing trash among others.

While much of our attention and focus during this session was reacting to and mobilizing around the global pandemic, we did see progress on a number of our legislative priorities.

A few achievements:

New voting law led to record voter turnout

Working in a strong coalition with the League of Women Voters/MA, Common Cause/MA, the Mass Voter Table and others we successfully campaigned for safe and accessible voting options, including vote-by-mail and early voting options during the pandemic. With record turnout in both our September primary and the November general election, Massachusetts voters set the standard for safe voting during a pandemic and set the template for the future of our state's democracy. These new rules were temporary however, and we will continue our work to make them permanent. The bill was filed by Reps. M. Moran and Lawn and Sens. Lesser and Hinds, and received overwhelming support in both the House and Senate.

New protections for student loan borrowers

In the final hours of the legislative session, state lawmakers passed the Student Loan Borrowers Bill of Rights, (Sen. Lesser & Rep. Higgins), which will provide new protections against predatory and deceptive lending practices to nearly 1 million student borrowers across the state.

Protecting kids and firefighters from harmful chemicals

On New Year's Day, Governor Baker signed the Children and Firefighters Protection Act (Rep. Decker and Sen. Creem) into law, after several years of effort. MASSPIRG, a member of the Alliance for a Healthy Tomorrow coalition, worked with the Professional Fire Fighters of Massachusetts, Built Environment+, the Fire Chiefs Association of Massachusetts, the American Academy of Pediatrics Massachusetts Chapter and many others to secure passage of this key public health initiative.

The new law bans 11 toxic flame retardants in children's products, mattresses, household furniture, carpeting and window coverings, and gives the Department of Environmental Protection the authority to ban additional flame retardants that are hazardous to human health and the environment.

Combating youth smoking

In the first half of the legislative session, the legislature passed a critical bill aimed at stemming the youth vaping epidemic. The MASSPIRG backed bill, an Act to Modernize Tobacco Control, (Rep. Gregoire and Sen. Keenan) is the first state law that prohibits the sale of all flavored tobacco products, including ecigarettes, menthol cigarettes and chewing tobacco. It's a major step to protect youth as four out of five kids who have used tobacco started with a flavored product.

Votes in This Scorecard

MASSPIRG is a not-for-profit, non-partisan advocate for the public interest. In our role as watchdog, we monitor the voting records of Massachusetts state lawmakers each legislative session. While a number of our legislative priorities passed into law, many more did not. Disappointingly, a number of popular bills were never even brought up for a vote – despite being approved by a committee and being cosponsored by a significant number of lawmakers. Further, many bills passed or failed with voice votes, or bills did not come up for a roll call vote unless the vote was unanimous or close to it.

These trends make it difficult to hold legislators accountable for their voting record. To make this scorecard more accurately reflect the distinctions and differences between lawmakers in the absence of more roll call votes on bills, we have included the co-sponsorship for one of our legislative priorities, the Energy Save Act filed by Rep. Josh Cutler. This bill was passed by voice vote in the House, included in a climate bill but vetoed by the Governor at the end of the session. The bill was again included in a similar climate bill in the current legislative session, passed by the Senate and House and was signed into law on March 26, 2021

Members of the Senate are scored out of 11 points (11 votes) and the House 8 points (7 votes and 1 bill co-sponsorship). The totals are recorded as a percentage. If the lawmaker was recorded as not voting on more than one vote, those were counted against the public interest, allowing for one instance of not being able to vote. Co-sponsorship counted in favor but lack of co-sponsorship did not count against. Lawmakers elected mid-year were recorded as Not In Office (NIO), those votes were not reflected in their totals. List of lawmakers scored are those in office at the end of the formal session, January 5, 2021.

Senate Votes and Co-Sponsorships:

#1 An Act to protect children, families, and firefighters from harmful flame retardants – Passed

The new law bans 11 toxic flame retardants in

children's products, mattresses, household furniture, carpeting and window coverings and gives the Department of Environmental

Protection the authority to ban additional flame retardants that are hazardous to human health and the environment. Vote on Engrossment. S2338. 9/19/2019. Senate Roll Call #94 [YEAS 38 - NAYS 0].

#2 An Act modernizing tobacco control – Passed

This law, stemming the youth vaping epidemic is the first state law that prohibits the sale of all flavored tobacco products, including e-cigarettes, menthol cigarettes and chewing tobacco. It's a major step to protect youth as four out of five kids who have used tobacco started with a flavored product. Vote on Engrossment. S2407. 11/20/2019. Senate Roll Call #144 [YEAS 32 - NAYS 6].

#3 An Act relative to pharmaceutical access, costs and transparency - <u>Did Not Pass</u>

This bill would have regulated and controlled pharmaceutical costs in the commonwealth by improving cost transparency, reducing prescription drug prices, increasing access to medication. This bill passed the senate but was not taken up by the House. Vote on Engrossment. S2397. 11/14/2019. Senate Roll Call #129 [40 YEAS - 0 NAYS].

#4 An Act relative to plastic bag reduction, enactment - Did Not Pass

This bill would have reduced plastic pollution by banning most single use plastic bags, similar to local laws passed in 90 cities and towns across the Commonwealth. This bill passed the Senate but was not taken up by the House. Vote on Engrossment. S2410. 11/20/2019. Senate Roll Call #150 [36 YEAS - 4 NAYS].

#5 An Act relative to Energy Savings Efficiency (Energy SAVE) - Did Not Pass*

The Energy SAVE act would have updated the energy and water efficiency standards for household and commercial appliances. The language was included in the final climate bill which was passed by the legislature but vetoed by the Governor. S2478. 1/30/2020. Senate Roll Call #166 [YEAS 35 to NAYS 2].

Votes in This Scorecard

#6 An Act to accelerate the transition of cars, trucks and buses to carbon-free power - <u>Did Not</u> Pass

This bill would have accelerated the transition of cars, trucks and buses to carbon-free power. It would require the MBTA to fully transition to electric buses by 2040, extending the electric vehicle tax credit. The bill would have also permanently authorized the Commonwealth's existing electric vehicle tax credit. The bill was passed by the Senate but not taken up but the House. Vote on Engrossment. S2476. 1/30/2020. Senate Roll Call #172 [YEAS 35 to NAY 2].

#7 An act authorizing and accelerating transportation investment - Amendment Failed

This amendment would have eliminated a provision to allow local communities to vote on whether to raise new revenue from local taxes for local transit projects, (RBI). We urged a No vote and the amendment failed. While the RBI passed the Senate, it failed to become law. S2813, amendment #230. 7/16/2020. Senate Roll Call #236 [YEAS 8 to NAYS 31].

#8 An Act relative to voting options in response to COVID-19 - Passed

This law was signed and implemented. The COVID-19 voting legislation was a temporary law that kept our fall elections safe, secure, and accessible to all voters by expanding vote by mail accessibility and early voting opportunities for both the primary and upcoming general elections. H4778. 6/16/20. Senate Roll Call #199 [40 YEAS to 0 NAYS].

#9 Regional Transit (RTA) Funding - Passed

This vote was to override Governor Baker's veto of line item 1595-6370 in the FY21 budget H5164. It restored \$3.5 million for Regional Transit Authorities (RTA). 12/28/20. Senate Roll Call #393 [38 YEAS to 1 NAYS].

#10 An Act authorizing and accelerating transportation investment - Passed

This new law authorizes billions of dollars of transportation spending to improve and expand transit across the Commonwealth. It would provide funding to repair and maintain our roads and

bridges. Vote on Engrossment. H5248. 1/5/2021. Senate Roll Call #480 [39 YEAS to 1 NAYS].

#11 Student Loan Borrower Bill of Rights - Passed

\This new law, which was included in the economic development bill H5250, established a Student Loan Borrower Bill of Rights (SLBBR). The "Bill of Rights" protects student loan borrowers from predatory lending practices, requires loan servicers to be licensed by the state and establishes an ombudsman to assist student borrowers. Vote on Engrossment H5250. 1/5/2021. Senate Roll Call #483 [40 YEAS to 0 NAYS].

House Votes and Co-sponsorships:

#1 An Act modernizing tobacco control - Passed

The new law, stemming the youth vaping epidemic is the first state law that prohibits the sale of all flavored tobacco products, including e-cigarettes, menthol cigarettes and chewing tobacco. It's a major step to protect youth as four out of five kids who have used tobacco started with a flavored product. Vote on Engrossment. H4183. 11/14/2019. House Roll Call #130 [127 YEAS - 31 NAYS].

#2 An Act relative to transportation finance - Amendment Failed

If passed, this amendment would have reduced overall transit revenue by exempting taxes on municipal use. We urged a No vote and the amendment failed. H4508, Amendment #4. 3/4/2020. House Roll Call #159 [36 YEAS to 118 NAYS].

#3 An Act relative to transportation finance - Did Not Pass

This bill would have increased the transit revenue by \$600 million annually, through an increase in TNC (Transportation Network Company) fees, and 5 cent tax on gas. The increase in TNC fees passed the house but was ultimately vetoed by the Governor; the gas tax was passed by the House but failed to be taken up by the Senate. Vote on Engrossment. H4508. 3/4/2020. House Roll Call #160 [113 YEAS to 40 NAYS].

Votes in This Scorecard

#4 An Act relative to Energy Savings Efficiency (Energy SAVE)* - List of House Bill Cosponsors - Did Not Pass*

The Energy SAVE Act would have updated the energy and water efficiency standards for household and commercial appliances. The bill was not voted on in the House, but we used the list of bill sponsors. Sponsoring the bill counted in favor but was not counted against if a member did not cosponsor. The Act was included in the final climate bill which was passed by the legislature but vetoed by the Governor. Cosponsor Signing. H2832. 1/30/2020.

#5 An Act relative to voting options in response to COVID-19 - Passed

This law was signed and implemented. The COVID-19 voting legislation is a temporary law that kept our fall elections safe, secure, and accessible to all voters by expanding vote by mail accessibility and early voting opportunities for both the primary and upcoming general elections. H4768. 6/4/2020. House Roll Call #184 [144 YEAS to 1 NAYS].

#6 Restoring funding for RTAs, Governor's veto of item 1595-6370 - Passed

This vote was to override Governor Baker's veto of line item 1595-6370 in the FY21 budget. It restored

\$3.5 million for Regional Transit Authorities (RTA). Vote on Engrossment. H5164. 12/28/20. House Roll Call #383 [148 YEAS to 8 NAYS].

#7 An Act authorizing and accelerating transportation investment to improve the Commonwealth's statewide transportation system - Passed

This new law authorizes billions of dollars of transportation spending to improve and expand transit across the Commonwealth. It would provide funding to repair and maintain our roads and bridges. Vote on Engrossment. H5248. 1/5/2021. House Roll Call #472 [146 YEAS to 0 NAYS].

#8 H5250 Student Loan Borrower Bill of Rights - Passed

This new law, which was included in the economic development bill H5250, established a Student Loan Borrower Bill of Rights (SLBBR). The "Bill of Rights" protects student loan borrowers from predatory lending practices, requires loan servicers to be licensed by the state and establishes an ombudsman to assist student borrowers. Vote on Engrossment. H5250. 1/5/2021. House Roll Call #474 [143 YEAS to 4 NAYS].

*The Energy Save Act was finally passed in the current (2021-22) legislature and was signed by the Governor in 2021.
