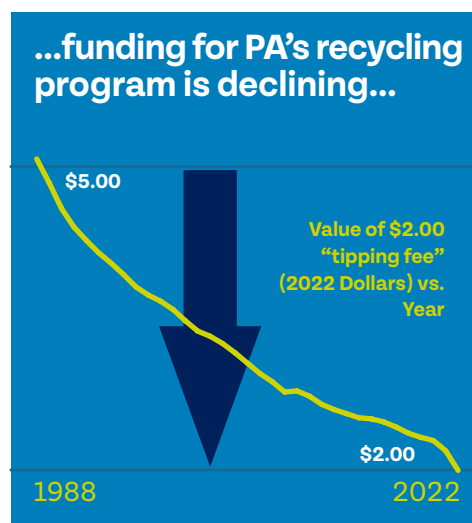
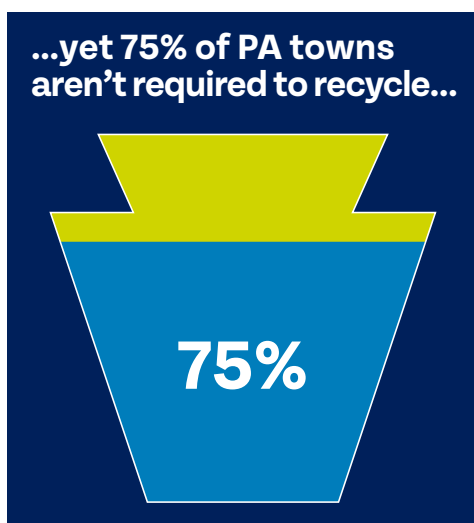
PA's recycling laws are outdated
