



The Owyhee Canyonlands in southeastern Oregon

is full of amazing plants, animals, and natural beauty. It needs to be protected forever.

The Owyhee Canyonlands is the largest conservation opportunity in the American West. It has colorful canyons, large areas of sagebrush, rivers, and streams. Over 200 kinds of animals live here, including the Greater sage-grouse and pronghorn antelope. There are also nearly 30 plant species that grow only here. Scientists say it might become one of the last places where you can see the night sky without light pollution. We need to protect the Owyhee Canyonlands before it gets damaged.

Oregonians agree

Oregon's senators Ron Wyden and Jeff Merkley have a proposal called the Malheur Community Empowerment for the Owyhee Act. But we're not sure what will happen to this proposal. So, we are asking President Biden to make the Owyhee Canyonlands a National Monument before the end of 2024. More than two-thirds of Oregonians support this.

Stronger protections, still accessible

Making the Owyhee Canyonlands a National Monument would protect it from harmful activities. This would keep the habitat safe for plants and animals. People would still be able to hike, raft, fish and stargaze.

We are working to teach more people about this special place. We need thousands of Oregonians and more organizations, businesses and elected officials across the state to join our campaign.

How you can help

Follow the steps below to make your voice heard. This is a great way to let our elected officials see that you also believe that the Owyhee Canyonlands deserve to be protected forever.
